Canned food drive planned for December



Curriculum Matters

The Discovery of Writing

Learning a new skill, especially one as comprehensive as writing, can be overwhelming as many of us remember from our own childhoods. An effective strategy is to break down the larger skill into its smaller components, which can each be more easily mastered as steps along the way.

Montessori uses this strategy in all areas of development, but none more effectively than in the acquisition of writing. A Montessori child is given myriad opportunities to gradually develop and exercise each of the smaller component skills, preparing for the day when he or she is ready to put it all together and "discover" how to write. Dr. Montessori divided these skills into two categories: preparation of the hand, and preparation of the mind.


From the earliest days in the Toddler or Primary class-room, each child is presented with activities that prepare the abilities of the hand both directly and indirectly. At the same time a child scrubs a table in a circular motion progressing from left to right and from the far side to the near, he is preparing his hand and arm for writing, which also proceeds from left to right and top to bottom. You may have noticed that most of the sensorial materials have knobs. When a child works with them, she is not only developing a discrimination of shape and dimension, but also

Upper Elementary math work




Lower Elementary biology work



Primary geography, science, and geometry work





"Good at Doing Things" Parent Education Night Enlightens, Entertains, and Inspires

Thank you for joining us on Thursday, October 21 at 7 p.m. for an enlightening and entertaining Parent Education Night and reception.

More than 150 parents, staff, and others were in attendance to hear Dr. Steven Hughes, pediatric neuropsychologist and assistant Professor of Pediatrics and Neurology at the University of Minnesota Medical School, talk about how Maria Montessori's approach to education parallels what we now know about brain development and fosters some of the most important development that occurs in the brain. The speech was at times entertaining, at times moving, and at times sobering as he gave both personal testimony and scientific evidence of the effectiveness of the Montessori method of education.

Dr. Hughes was careful to emphasize throughout the talk that one of the most important ways to ensure that children's brains develop appropriately and healthily is to provide them with experiences in the environment that allows children to explore and learn for themselves. He also emphasized the importance of the hands in providing input to the brains. Given these facts, why, he asked, would you design a learning environment that involves children sitting quietly for hours on end listening to lectures?

Dr. Hughes' talk was followed by a lovely reception and gallery of student work. Rain forced the reception indoors to Emily and Teesie's classroom, but the beautifully transformed surroundings made it a special experience.

developing the strength and dexterity needed for a pencil grip. In the case of the cylinder blocks, the very thickness of the knobs closely resembles that of a pencil. In using two fingers to trace each inset of the geometric cabinet before replacing it in the tray, the child is practicing the conformation of his writing fingers to a two-dimensional shape.

A more direct preparation for the physical act of writing begins with the sandpaper letters. In essence, she is practicing writing the letter as she traces the textured shape. A final direct preparation comes in the form of the metal insets, where the child fills in a geometric shape, staying within boundaries and moving a color pencil up and down, up and down, and gradually moving from left to right.

At the same time that the hand is being prepared, parallel activities develop the mental aspects of writing. Writing is communication, after all, and to communicate one must not only recognize the sounds and symbols of the language, but also have words and ideas to communicate. Therefore, the indirect preparation of the mind begins with the extraordinary emphasis Montessori places upon vocabulary and conversation.

With colorful card material the children learn the correct nomenclature for everything from plants and animals, fruits and vegetables, tools and musical instruments, to modes of transportation, or things you would find in the kitchen or along the street. After experience in discriminating and organizing the sensorial materials, children learn the names of colors, plane and solid geometric shapes, as well as the language of qualities including the comparative and superlative forms. Selected prints and photographs, as well as

natural specimens, are rotated in and out of the classroom periodically to stimulate conversation, and teachers lead small groups of children in acting out verb commands, or in question games, exploring the "what, where, when, and how" of the world around them.

The teacher also lays the foundation for later word studies by playing games with homonyms, antonyms, and classified nouns. When they gather in small groups, they play sound games, learning to differentiate the phonetic sounds of English. Then, having become adept at distinguishing the beginning, middle and ending sounds of words, a more direct preparation of the mind starts with the introduction of the aforementioned sandpaper letters, associating each phonetic sound with its corresponding symbol. Once a child has mastered 12-15 of these symbols, the teacher will introduce the moveable alphabet, a box of cut out letters for the formation of words. At first, she may dictate three- and four-letter phonetic words for the child to compose, but soon the child will want to make his own ideas visible by making words with the moveable alphabet. One day she will ask for a chalkboard to record the words she has "written" with the moveable alphabet, and then finally she will progress to paper and pencil.

In this way the child gradually builds up all of the skills of writing without ever knowing he is doing so. On that magical day he will put it all together for himself, combining both the physical and mental preparations and discover that he is writing, as if for the first time in the history of the world. The entire process has taken years yet has been entirely natural, corresponding with the natural development of the child's brain and body. How different from the prolonged drudgery with which most of us adults learned how to write, and not overwhelming at all.
